He helps the AHA bridge the clinical setting and the community as leader of the National Hypertension Control Initiative volunteer advisory group, which has seen great strides in blood pressure control at participating Federally Qualified Health Centers.

His vision inspired a three-year American Heart Association/ American Stroke Association initiative by the same name launched in 2022 and funded by a \$15.6 million grant by HCA Healthcare and the HCA Healthcare Foundation. The initiative deepens neurology-cardiology collaboration, addresses health care disparities and empowers patients to manage their stroke risk.
